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### **LETTER FROM CO-FOUNDERS**

Although 2020 and 2021 have presented us all with unexpected challenges, our programs remained as strong as ever and we have so much to be grateful for.

Despite the pandemic, we have achieved so much in the last two years. We have distributed 3,790 wheelchairs, provided vital daily rehabilitation to 100 children and funded \$143,460 in ground-breaking Spinal Cord Injury Research. We completed our biggest ever distribution in Northern Uganda, continued to support our centres and staff in Kenya and India throughout the pandemic, built the *HHA Walkabout Wheelchair Distribution Centre* in Haiti, launched our first-ever *Monitoring and Evaluation Pilot Project* in Uganda, distributed 100 paediatric wheelchairs to kids in desperate need in Venezuela, held a few very successful events such as our first-ever *Virtual Holiday Auction*, which raised a staggering £150,000 and surpassed all our expectations, as well as our annual *Closet Treasure Sale*, which raised an incredible £55,000 in the space of just 3 days.

None of this would have been possible without the hard work of our local partners around the world, our amazing team and incredible supporters like you. Thank you for supporting us through thick and thin, empowering our mission and helping us change thousands of lives around the developing world year on year. Even in the crazy years that were 2020 and 2021. Every day, thanks to your support, we are getting one step closer to our mission of changing the world of mobility disabilities - one person, one wheelchair at a time, so that no one gets left behind.



### **THE SHIRLEY RYAN ABILITYLAB**

Finding a cure for paralysis is core to Walkabout's mission. Over the years, Walkabout Foundation has been a part of some of the biggest breakthroughs in the discipline of Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) research. We began investing in studies into reducing and reversing the effects of Spinal Cord Injuries in 2010, and over a decade later, we have funded over \$1.7 million in SCI research! The discipline has made incredible progress and leading scientists are hopeful about the prospect of finding a cure in the near future.

Since 2019, we have been funding an innovative Neuromodulation & Motor Control Lab Study at the Shirley Ryan Ability Lab, led by Dr Monica Perez. The research aims to promote the recovery of function in people with Spinal Cord Injuries. The study tests 30 patients, using transcutaneous stimulation, followed by 40 guided sessions of exercises in motor control and physical therapy.

The results have been fantastic! Most of the participants have improved their voluntary movements, while others have taken their first steps! Since each participant and their injuries are unique, the results have been unique too - but the progress made here is extremely hopeful and exciting news for the Spinal Cord Injury community and the progress of non-invasive stimulation therapy.

### **TRANSCUTANEOUS STIMULATION**

Nerves in the spinal cord send signals from the spine to the legs

> When the spine is damaged these signals are often too weak to create movement







This non-invasive technique stimulates the spinal cord from the surface of the skin. Utilization of a unique waveform permits high-current electrical stimulation to reach spinal networks without causing discomfort

Transcutaneous stimulation activates sensory motor pathways to enable growth in areas of strength endurance, increased mobility and sensations

When combined with physical rehabilitation, some damaged nerves are restored

# **AMBER'S STORY**

Meet Amber Bruce , one of the participants of the *Shirley Ryan AbilityLab* study. One morning while getting ready for work, Amber fell down, hit her head on the wall and woke up moments later with a C5-C6 incomplete Spinal Cord Injury (SCI). She was taken to the hospital to undergo emergency surgery and spent a few months recovering in the hospital.

Despite being told that she would never walk again, Amber was determined to work on her recovery and researched medical trials she could get involved in. With the help of her brother, they came across the *Shirley Ryan AbilityLab* and took off for Chicago. After 40 sessions of non-invasive stimulation and rehabilitation, Amber finally took her first steps again!

I am very grateful to Walkabout Foundation for all their support towards our research. Their support has allowed us to refine our neurostimulation protocol and expand our procedures to a number of people with severe paralysis. We are humbled by their support and committed to keep working on improving the quality of life of people with SCI!

# **KENYA**

### CHILDREN GIVE REHABILITATION CHILDREN GIVE

According to the WHO, there are 7.7 million disabled adults in Kenya, of which only 33% are employed. For those with mobility disabilities in this country, life is incredibly hard.

We began working in Kenya in 2014. Since then, we have distributed **5,415 wheelchairs**, in over half of Kenya's 47 counties and trained **10 locals** to assess, fit and provide follow-up for our wheelchair recipients. In 2018, we open our first ever *Wheelchair Assembly and Repair Centre*. At our centre, we employ a local team of wheelchair riders who assemble our wheelchairs on site and collaborate with the rest of our local team in fitting beneficiaries every day.

We also run a rehabilitation unit at our centre, where the local team provides monthly rehabilitation to **100 children** with mobility disabilities and training programmes to their carers. Opening our *Wheelchair Assembly and Repair Centre* has allowed us to invest in the local team and economy, while providing a constant supply of wheelchairs to the region and developing all our product lines locally. It has also allowed us to lower beneficiary waiting times, offer a wider range of wheelchair models to cater to people's specific needs and provide constant repairs and modifications. At our centre, we have developed our very own contour seating system for children with complex positioning needs. In 2020, we became the largest wheelchair provider in the country!

The opening of our centre means that we are now able to offer holistic services to people with disabilities in Kenya, including rehabilitation, carer training, wheelchair provision and follow-up.



# **KENYA**

### FAITH'S STORY

Faith is a 20-year-old woman from Kenya. She was born with spina bifida and severe scoliosis, and therefore has never been able to walk. In June 2021, she visited our Wheelchair Assembly & Repair Centre in Nanyuki, where our incredible local team gave Faith a custom fitted wheelchair.

Thanks to our local team, Faith finally has the dignity, freedom and independence that she deserves. She can finally move around independently and be a part of the community. She has applied for an undergraduate course in Journalism at one of the local universities and cannot wait to get her degree!

# HAITI

# CHAIRS DISTRIBUTED DISTRIBUTED DISTRIBUTED TRAINED TRAINED

Haiti was the first country we ever visited back in 2009. In Haiti, people with disabilities are among the most vulnerable, with conditions prohibiting their independence and access to key services such as education and healthcare, which prevents them from being a part of the community.

In 2021, we returned to Haiti to build the *HHA Walkabout Wheelchair Distribution Centre* together with our long-standing partner, Hope Health Action. Our centre will provide Haiti with a regular and sustainable supply of wheelchairs, transforming hundreds of lives every year and becoming the single largest wheelchair provider in the country. We hope the centre will become a regional hub for Haiti, replicating our successful Kenya model, where we can hire local wheelchair riders who will assemble and distribute a minimum of 900 wheelchairs per year.

By opening our centre, we are investing in local expertise and creating lasting, sustainable change in the country. We are currently working with 19 local partners that deliver our wheelchairs from the centre. Since opening, we have already distributed **828 wheelchairs** from the centre!



We are incredibly excited and humbled to be bringing the Haiti project to life alongside our partner, Hope Health Action, who are also experts in the field of mobility disability and care needs in Haiti. We believe that together, we will make a sustainable impact in a country so close to our hearts and history.

# **CYVIL'S STORY**

# CHAIRS CHAIRS TRIBUT

In Tanzania, where 1 in 5 people live below the poverty line, there are approximately 4.2 million people living with a disability, with mobility being the second most common form of disability in the country. The lack of infrastructure and local support means that the average time a person waits for a wheelchair in the country is 22 years.

Since 2017, we have been working with Mobility Care, an independent local wheelchair producer in Arusha, who uses only local resources to make quality wheelchairs. This de-centralized local provisioning process means much shorter waiting times for the beneficiaries in the region. By doing this, we not only invest in the local economy, but also offer assistance with product development based on our experience with a wide range of wheelchairs.

Cyvil is a 20-year-old man from Tanzania. He was born with an unknown physical disability, and therefore has never been able to walk. In March 2021, he received a tricycle from one of our local partners, UWABUKA.

Thanks to our local partners, Cyvil now has the dignity, freedom and independence that he deserves. He can finally move around independently, interact with his peers, get an education, attend church with his family and be a part of the community.

I had a lot of difficulties moving around and was discriminated against by the people in my society. I couldn't participate in social activities and lost my right of getting an education. It was

# UGANDA

CHAIRS DISTRIBUTED DISTRIBUTED DISTRIBUTED LOCALS TRAINED

Northern Uganda is home to one of the biggest refugee crises in the world. The South Sudanese Civil War caused nearly two million refugees to flee to Northern Uganda. There are currently 1.5 million refugees residing in Bidi Bidi and Palorinya refugee camps.

We began working in Uganda in 2014 and to date we have distributed **2,213 wheelchairs and tricycles** throughout the country. In 2020, we returned to Bidi Bidi and Palorinya refugee camps to complete our biggest distribution in the region. We provided **371 wheelchairs** to the most vulnerable individuals and **trained 13 local volunteers** to the basic level of World Health Organisation (WHO) wheelchair provision standards, which means they are able to fit and modify wheelchairs themselves, provide repairs and follow-up. By doing this, we are not only serving those in most desperate need, but also investing in the local economy, building local expertise and driving resilience, sustainability and long-term ownership.

In 2021, we returned to Uganda once again to distribute **320** wheelchairs and **50** trikes through our local partners, World Action Fund and Hope Health Action.

# UGANDA

### MONITORING AND EVALUATION PILOT PROJECT

In March 2021, we launched our first-ever *Monitoring and Evaluation Pilot Project* in Northern Uganda with Hope Health Action. This project allowed us to follow-up with approximately **400 refugees** that received our wheelchairs from 2017 to 2020. Following up with our past beneficiaries is a very important part of our work, as it allows us to continue to provide them with support long after we first served them!



### COLINES' STORY

Colines is a smiley and bright 8-year-old boy from Uganda. He contracted polio at the age of three and has never been able to walk. His single mother, Lenia, has been forced to stay at home to look after him, making it very hard for her to find a stable job.

We met Colines and his mother in Uganda in October 2021. Our local partner, World Action Fund Uganda, gave him his first-ever wheelchair! Thanks to his new chair, Colines can finally move around independently, go to school, make new friends and be a part of the community. When the local team spoke to Colines' mother, she had tears of joy in her eyes. When we asked her why, she said:

# INDIA

### CHILDREN IN PROGRAMME

We started working in India in 2014, and immediately saw that besides wheelchairs, there was an enormous need for increased awareness and destigmatisation of disability, adequate therapy and educational opportunities for children with disabilities. In 2016, we opened the *JJ Walkabout Rehabilitation Centre* in Varanasi. At our centre, we provide rehabilitation, education and care to **33 children** with mobility disabilities, as well as offer support to their parents. 5 years after opening the centre, 12 children have entered mainstream schooling and 21 have learnt to walk.

Due to the pandemic situation in India, our centre had to close down throughout 2020-2021. However, our local team continued to provide vital food rations for kids and their families, as well as rehabilitation advice to ensure the children continue making progress in their development.

In June 2021, the centre was partially reopened and started accepting seven children a day to receive vital physiotherapy sessions, skills training and education in a comfortable and caring environment. Currently, 23 children attend the Centre daily and 10 children are visited by physiotherapists and teachers on a daily basis. The local team has resumed the *Mother Training Programme*, which focuses on supporting and training mothers of children with disabilities. They have also been offering young people with disabilities an opportunity to work at the centre's petty shop to help bring in income during these difficult times.



# VENEZUELA

# CHAIRS DISTRIBUTED

In 2020, our star supporter and #WalkaboutHero, Kirk Williams, raised an epic **\$22,000** towards a container of 100 paediatric wheelchairs for Venezuela. For this distribution, we have partnered with Chamos and Fundaprocura. Due to the impact of the pandemic on international shipping, our distribution in Venezuela was delayed, with all the wheelchairs distributed in October 2021.

# **ARGENTINA**

In December 2021, thanks to our generous donors, we returned to Argentina to distribute 300 RoughRider wheelchairs to locals in need together with Centro de Inclusión Libre y Solidario de Argentina (CILSA) and Fundación Banco de la Nación Argentina (FBNA).









# **VIRTUAL HOLIDAY AUCTION**


